EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

It was a very hopeful year for the arts and for the Arts Council in Maple Ridge. The 22/23 season marked the start of the Arts Council's anticipated three to five-year programming and operational recovery from the Pandemic, and operations and programs continued to gradually increase.

One of our biggest challenges was the tight labour market, which resulted in vacancies in many departments for most of the year. However, determined professionalism, flexible resiliency and an abundance of creativity by the staff carried us through the year's end with minimal impact on our programs.

Despite these and other challenges over the year, we:

connected our community, through 674 activities taking place at The ACT, and off-site, provided after school programs to seven elementary schools, awarded scholarships to graduating seniors for excellence in the arts, and provided Arts Partner Grants support for arts-based projects throughout the community;

provided hands-on learning through The Arts Learning Programs, which saw consistent growth throughout the year, finishing with a 21% increase in participation;

connected audiences to an increased number of live performing artists through The ACT Presents Series, offering an expanded 35-show season, which saw audiences grow by 55%;

promoted visual literacy and engagement through the Art Gallery's five professionally-curated exhibitions and enhancement activities, resulting in a 60% increase in attendees:

upgraded and improved The ACT Arts Centre facility, now in its 20th year, and still one of Maple Ridge's most cherished public spaces;

and envisioned the future, as we began a strategic planning process for the next three years, including exploring further ways to embrace diversity, inclusion, access and reconciliation in our programs and practices.

Though the pandemic headwinds began to decrease over the season and participation grew in all programs, the Centre is still a long way from a total recovery, having finished the year at a little over half of its pre-pandemic attendance. We knew that recovery would be gradual, and we will continue to work diligently, strategically, and creatively, to connect people with excellent and meaningful arts experiences as we continue to recover, rebuild and reconnect.

We are deeply grateful to so many who give their time, energy and support to the work of the Arts Council: our dedicated volunteers, without whom the Centre could not operate; our committed funders, sponsors and annual fund donors, who support the value we contribute to thousands of lives; and the Board of Directors, whose thoughtful and considered leadership provides stability in our operations and accountability to our mission.

Now in its 52nd year, The Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows Arts Council continues to strive to uplift, inspire and connect our community.









FINANCES, RECOVERY AND SUSTAINABILITY

The Arts Council continued to rebuild operational capacity while benefiting from final phase recovery grants and funding programs. What is expected to be the last pandemic funding support came from the Federal and Provincial governments. Earned revenue came primarily through registration fees, rental income, and ticket sales, which met their budget goals.

Early audience response indicates a modest and gradual recovery in attendance in the theatres, but is not yet tracking to pre-pandemic levels. Operating deficits are anticipated for the next 2-3 years as we recover and rebuild audiences. Projected sources to sustain core operations are past fiscal years' reserves, which have been restricted by the Board of Directors to sustain long-term recovery.
