Another busy and exciting year at The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre has gone by. As a Board of Directors, and in collaboration with staff and stakeholders, we completed a dynamic 3-year Strategic Plan. Many hours of thought, reflection and dreaming went into preparing our goals and vision for the future of our beloved Arts Centre.

The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre embraces our leadership role in providing strong community, professional and educational arts experiences, providing access to the Arts for all segments of the community, and in promoting engagement with the Arts as means to foster the creativity of individuals and organizations in our community. The MRPMAC/Act Arts Centre's continual efforts in the area of community engagement are based on the understanding that cultural and artistic engagement is vital to a healthy community and society, and that the Arts can benefit everyone.

## **Promoting Access**

Through our **Arts Angels** and **School Access Programs**, and with the support of Westminster Savings Credit Union Foundation, the Haney and Ridge Meadows Rotaries, and numerous donors, The MRMPAC/ACT Arts Centre provides access to arts learning programs, live performances, and Art Gallery educational workshops for youth, through ticket underwriting support for those in need. We work with Community Services, the Seniors Network, Immigrant Services Society and many other community service groups to ensure that these programs serve the widest possible need.

## **Supporting Youth**

The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre awarded its annual Careers in Arts Scholarship Awards to five exemplary School District 42 students. Scholarships of \$1,500 were awarded as part the organization's annual commitment to supporting the artistic aspirations of students in the community.

For over twenty years the Careers in Arts Scholarship Awards have supported graduating seniors in their continued education in their artistic disciplines at an accredited post-secondary institution. Selection is based on a combination of demonstrated artistic achievement, technical skill & level of presentation, grades relating to the artistic category, personal resume, and planned attendance at a post-secondary institution.

## **Community Days**

Community Days offer free-of-charge hands-on activities at The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre, in partnership with City of Maple Ridge and with other organizations. We are grateful to the **Maple Ridge Community Foundation** for a grant supporting these activities in 2018-2019.

**Culture Day 2018** was a rhythm-inspired event inspired by the theme "OnBeat".

Participants enjoyed a variety of hands-on Arts Programming Activities including mini guitar classes with a fantastic new addition to the Arts Programming team, Jason Matheny, a musical craft with our beloved "celebrity" preschool art instructor Miss Shelly, a mini-dance class sampler with Chloe Zondag, and a hands-on communal work of clay art. The "beat" further came alive as participants were exposed to a variety of world percussion instruments by Boris Sichon and a fibre arts spinning wheel demonstration by Gallery Curator Barbara Duncan.



A Christmas Tradition was a festive day for residents to enjoy The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre's stunning 20 foot Christmas tree, photo opportunities with Frosty the Snowman himself, free holiday art Activities, a caroling singalong, and free hot chocolate and apple cider. To celebrate BC's Family Day, The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre partnered with the Maple Ridge **Historical Society** and the Maple Ridge branch of the Fraser Valley Regional Library to offer a fantastic day of family Activities attended by over 400 people. Activities included creating rain sticks, clay play, a community mosaic, hands-on heritage crafts, and dance exploration. Children's entertainer Jacky Essombe entertained audiences with a participatory performance of music played on a variety of traditional African instruments and stores re-enforcing the community concepts of the traditional African village.

The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre's Youth Art **Ambassadors**, the youth volunteer corps, once again put on the popular parent-participation Easter event, A 'Hop'ening Time for children ages 2 - 12. Children and their parents enjoyed a circuit of seven holiday-themed craft and activity stations. As well as being an engaging event for the whole community, the event is also a fundraiser for the Youth Art Ambassadors to help them run more programs and support development of their skills in community service.

The 3rd event in the 3-year pilot partnership with Ridge Studios produced a 2-day festival event of feature film screenings shot and or produced in BC. The festival also included the SD42 Cyber school film class students and their parents and friends for a screening of the film work created by the students, before culminating with the award-winning films Meditation Park and Rehearsal.

## THE ACT PRESENTS PERFORMANCE SERIES

The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre continued to present professional-quality performances, bringing regional, national and international artists to its stages, in a broad range of Theatre, Dance, Music, Family, Holiday and Variety performances for all ages and interests.

The 2018/19 season – the 16th at the ACT Arts Centre – in kicked off with **Oktoberfest on Opening Night**, featuring trumpeter Jens Lindemann, former frontman for the Canadian Brass and the first brass player to receive the Order of Canada. Lindemann joined The Bergmann Piano Duo on the mainstage performing a variety show of classics and jazz, for the first, but certainly not the last standing ovation of the season.

Audiences enjoyed Morning Classical Coffee Concerts, when the Bergmanns returned throughout the season with guest artists Daniel Bolshoy (classical guitar), Beth Root Sandvoss (cello), and Nadya Blanchette (soprano), respectively.

Theatre offerings featured Arts Club On Tour, which engaged audiences with life and love lessons in **The Piano Teacher**, the spontaneous improv theatre hilarity of Blind Date, and a



celebratory 'take' on Joni Mitchell's music with Circle Game.

Music was a significant part of the community's season with high-energy mainstage performances by BC World Music **Collective** and **The Boom Booms**. The inaugural Friday Night Listening Lounge Series in the Studio Theatre, which creates a cabaret-style live music 'club' in the heart of Maple Ridge, featured intimate performances by JUNO

Holiday performances included Sultans of String's Christmas Caravan, Bill Mays and the Toronto Jazz Septet's Jazzy Nutcracker, and the perennial favourite, Winter Harp in their 25th anniversary performance for two sold-out shows.

New in 2018-2019, the ACT Arts Centre became a site for selected National Theatre Live Encore **Broadcasts**, filmed productions from London's famed National Theatre, welcoming audiences to Frankenstein and The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time. Other events included The Golden Ears Movie Series (GEMS) The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre's film series presented in partnership with the Toronto International Film Festival, and special seasonal screenings of the Fright Night classic, Psycho, and the romantic biopic of monster-maker, Mary Shelley. The third Maple Ridge Festival of BC Film connected patrons with some of the provincial film industry's best work.

The season was capped by a **final standing ovation** for the performance by the European Cello Octet, **Ô-Celli**.

## ARTS LEARNING PROGRAMS

Arts Learning Programs served over 3,500 people of all ages this year.

The popular and frequently sold-out adult **artBAR evenings**, in which participants 19+ can try an art activity over a glass of wine, have continued to grow in popularity, and reached capacity in many cases throughout the year. We are looking forward to expanding these offerings to meet the demand for this program in 2019-2020.

In addition to **over 300 classes and workshops**, for the first time, The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre produced a Spring Break Arts Camp specially designed for Kanaka Creek Elementary School students, who run on a different timetable than other SD42 schools. Students enjoyed a week with our professional instructors learning a range of art skills. Following this success, we plan to offer December and April camps for Kanaka students in 2019-20.

New STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) programs were introduced this year, as well as **semi-private guitar lessons for children and adults**. The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre's **ceramics studio continues to grow**, with steadily increasing adult and youth participation.

## THE ACT ART GALLERY

Programming in the ACT Arts Centre Gallery embraces diversity and balance each season, with a balance of both Craft and Fine Art, local and regional artists, and youth and adult artwork exhibitions that brought a record number of visitors to the gallery this season, representing an increase of 1,209 patrons over the year previous.

The Gallery's **six exhibitions drew thousands** of visitors this season, and included the **Whonnock Weavers and Spinners Guild's** exhibit. Out of the Woods. Ensemble 2018 Juried Group Exhibition, Gary Wyatt and Jay Bundy Johnson's innovative **Soundscape/** Landscape, the popular School District 42 Secondary School Art Show, a solo show of works by **Jane Kenyon**, and finished he Gallery season with the **Ceramica Botanica** group exhibition.

In the fine craft category, we were delighted to open the season with an outstanding local group, the Whonnock Weavers and Spinners (WWSG). Also representative of the 'fine craft' category, our exhibition Ceramica Botanica demonstrated the close alignment of ceramics and plant forms. The paintings of local artist Tammy Routley were a perfect foil to the strikingly wide range of ceramics included in this exhibition.

The exhibition and sale **Ensemble** is truly representative of as many art forms as could possibly be encompass in a single exhibition. The invitation for artists to create small, carefully curated ensembles of their work, has always drawn together an amazingly diverse and compelling collection of work for this annual exhibition. 

## FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY

The MRPMAC/ACT Arts Centre programs are sustained by balanced funding from the municipal, provincial and federal governments through grants for operations and for specific programs and projects; through individual, civic and corporate contributions to the Annual Fund and specific programs: through sponsorship partnerships with corporations and businesses in the community and through creative annual fundraisers.

New this year, a series of three educational and entertaining Wine Blending Parties led by a professional of the wine industry welcomed patrons through an educational and entertaining evening, culminating in friendly competition of wine blending 'teams' to win 'best blend of the evening'. The Annual fundraising event TeaGarden, in the Gallery engaged guests with an informative and entertaining presentation by local garden personality, Janis Matson.

Earned revenue includes ticket sales and class fee revenues; gallery and shop sales; concession revenue and rental income from the many promoters, film production teams, and community rental clients who use the facility annually.




